

We did not receive funding for the school year 2013/2014 to implement bullying programs. Schools also chose not to release children from normal class schedules to implement Bullying programs in the school setting.

The schools are continuing to fund the success programs in their schools as they are seeing the positive impact. Highland County has started a Drug Coalition; from these meetings we have identified the need to address collaboratively drug addiction in our county. This issue has impacted on the all areas of our community from babies being born addicted, families being torn apart, grandparents becoming parents again, increase in crime, teens having babies and impacting on the number of deaths of children in our county. It was the opportunity of meeting and discussing this issue with also our Early Childhood Collaborative Committee that we identified the needed to meet young people at their level and find ways to creatively engage with them about the impact of Drugs and unsafe choices.

Greenfield Schools students all improved or maintained their grades and made positive choices. Hillsboro schools data was not available in time for report.

Highland County FCFC through conversations with students and with community coalitions identified that there is a need to engage with young people and empower them to make healthy choices for themselves and their families. Highland County is ranked number 4 among the 88 Ohio counties in teen pregnancy. Teen pregnancy is closely linked to a host of critical social issues – poverty and income, overall child well-being, out-of-wedlock births, responsible fatherhood, health issues, education, child welfare, and other risky behavior.

Consequently, it is for this reason that teen pregnancy should be viewed not only as a reproductive health issue, but how it affects our community and how we can work to stop the cycle of these events.
